Page 161, after line 2, insert the following:

1 (n) REQUIREMENT TO SUBMIT NATIONAL SYN-  
2 THETIC DRUGS ACTION STRATEGY.—Not later than 120  
3 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Direc-  
4 tor of National Drug Control Policy shall submit to Con-  
5 gress the National Synthetic Drugs Action Strategy out-  
6 lined in the National Synthetic Drugs Action Plan sub-  
7 mitted by the Director in October 2004.

8 (o) REQUIREMENT FOR STUDY OF STATE PRE-  
9 CURSOR CHEMICAL CONTROL LAWS.—

10 (1) STUDY.—The Director of National Drug  
11 Control Policy shall conduct a study of State laws  
12 with respect to precursor chemical controls.

13 (2) REPORT.—Not later than six months after  
14 the date of the enactment of this Act, the Director  
15 of National Drug Control Policy shall submit a re-  
16 port to Congress on the results of the study under  
17 paragraph (1), including—



1 (A) a comparison of the State laws studied  
2 and the effectiveness of each such law; and

3 (B) a list of best practices observed with  
4 respect to such laws.

5 (p) REQUIREMENT FOR STUDY OF DRUG ENDAN-  
6 GERED CHILDREN PROGRAMS.—

7 (1) STUDY.—The Director of National Drug  
8 Control Policy shall conduct a study of methamphet-  
9 amine-related activities that are conducted by dif-  
10 ferent Drug Endangered Children programs admin-  
11 istered by States.

12 (2) REPORT.—Not later than six months after  
13 the date of the enactment of this Act, the Director  
14 of National Drug Control Policy shall submit to  
15 Congress a report on the results of the study under  
16 paragraph (1). Such report shall include—

17 (A) an analysis of the best practices of the  
18 activities studied; and

19 (B) recommendations for establishing a  
20 national policy to address drug endangered chil-  
21 dren, based on the Drug Endangered Children  
22 programs administered by States.

23 (3) DEFINITIONS.—In this subsection—

24 (A) the term “methamphetamine-related  
25 activity” means any activity related to the pro-



1           duction, use, or effects of methamphetamine;  
2           and

3                   (B) the term “drug endangered children”  
4           means children whose physical, mental, or emo-  
5           tional health are at risk because of the produc-  
6           tion, use, or effects of methamphetamine by an-  
7           other person.

          At the end of the bill, add the following new sections  
(and conform the table of contents accordingly):

8   **SEC. 20. NATIONAL METHAMPHETAMINE INFORMATION**  
9                   **CLEARINGHOUSE.**

10           (a) **SHORT TITLE.**—This Act may be cited as the  
11 “National Methamphetamine Information Clearinghouse  
12 Act of 2005”.

13           (b) **DEFINITIONS.**—In this section—

14                   (1) the term “Council” means the National  
15 Methamphetamine Advisory Council established  
16 under subsection (c)(2)(A);

17                   (2) the term “drug endangered children” means  
18 children whose physical, mental, or emotional health  
19 are at risk because of the production, use, or effects  
20 of methamphetamine by another person;

21                   (3) the term “National Methamphetamine In-  
22 formation Clearinghouse” or “NMIC” means the in-



1 formation clearinghouse established under subsection  
2 (c)(1); and

3 (4) the term “qualified entity” means a State  
4 or local government, school board, or public health,  
5 law enforcement, nonprofit, or other nongovern-  
6 mental organization providing services related to  
7 methamphetamine.

8 (c) ESTABLISHMENT OF CLEARINGHOUSE AND ADVI-  
9 SORY COUNCIL.—

10 (1) CLEARINGHOUSE.—There is established,  
11 under the supervision of the Director of National  
12 Drug Control Policy, an information clearinghouse  
13 to be known as the National Methamphetamine In-  
14 formation Clearinghouse.

15 (2) ADVISORY COUNCIL.—

16 (A) IN GENERAL.—There is established an  
17 advisory council to be known as the National  
18 Methamphetamine Advisory Council.

19 (B) MEMBERSHIP.—The Council shall con-  
20 sist of 10 members appointed by the Director  
21 of National Drug Control Policy—

22 (i) not fewer than three of whom shall  
23 be representatives of law enforcement  
24 agencies;



1 (ii) not fewer than four of whom shall  
2 be representatives of nongovernmental and  
3 nonprofit organizations providing services  
4 related to methamphetamine; and

5 (iii) one of whom shall be a represent-  
6 ative of the Department of Health and  
7 Human Services.

8 (C) PERIOD OF APPOINTMENT; VACAN-  
9 CIES.—Members shall be appointed for three  
10 years. Any vacancy in the Council shall not af-  
11 fect its powers, but shall be filled in the same  
12 manner as the original appointment.

13 (d) NMIC REQUIREMENTS AND REVIEW.—

14 (1) IN GENERAL.—The NMIC shall promote  
15 sharing information regarding successful law en-  
16 forcement, treatment, environmental, social services,  
17 and other programs related to the production, use,  
18 or effects of methamphetamine and grants available  
19 for such programs.

20 (2) COMPONENTS.—The NMIC shall include—

21 (A) a toll-free number; and

22 (B) a website that—

23 (i) provides information on the short-  
24 term and long-term effects of methamphet-  
25 amine use;



1 (ii) provides information regarding  
2 methamphetamine treatment programs and  
3 programs for drug endangered children, in-  
4 cluding descriptions of successful programs  
5 and contact information for such pro-  
6 grams;

7 (iii) provides information regarding  
8 grants for methamphetamine-related pro-  
9 grams, including contact information and  
10 links to websites;

11 (iv) allows a qualified entity to submit  
12 items to be posted on the website regard-  
13 ing successful public or private programs  
14 or other useful information related to the  
15 production, use, or effects of methamphet-  
16 amine;

17 (v) includes a restricted section that  
18 may only be accessed by a law enforcement  
19 organization that contains successful strat-  
20 egies, training techniques, and other infor-  
21 mation that the Council determines helpful  
22 to law enforcement agency efforts to com-  
23 bat the production, use or effects of meth-  
24 amphetamine;



1 (vi) allows public access to all infor-  
2 mation not in a restricted section; and

3 (vii) contains any additional informa-  
4 tion the Council determines may be useful  
5 in combating the production, use, or ef-  
6 fects of methamphetamine.

7 (3) REVIEW OF POSTED INFORMATION.—

8 (A) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 30 days  
9 after the date of submission of an item by a  
10 qualified entity, the Council shall review an  
11 item submitted for posting on the website de-  
12 scribed in paragraph (2)(B)—

13 (i) to evaluate and determine whether  
14 the item, as submitted or as modified,  
15 meets the requirements for posting; and

16 (ii) in consultation with the Director  
17 of National Drug Control Policy, to deter-  
18 mine whether the item should be posted in  
19 a restricted section of the website.

20 (B) DETERMINATION.—Not later than 45  
21 days after the date of submission of an item,  
22 the Council shall—

23 (i) post the item on the website de-  
24 scribed in paragraph (2)(B); or



1 (ii) notify the qualified entity that  
2 submitted the item regarding the reason  
3 such item shall not be posted and modi-  
4 fications, if any, that the qualified entity  
5 may make to allow the item to be posted.

6 (4) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

7 There are authorized to be appropriated—

8 (A) for fiscal year 2007—

9 (i) \$1,000,000 to establish the NMIC  
10 and Council; and

11 (ii) such sums as are necessary for  
12 the operation of the NMIC and Council;  
13 and

14 (B) for each of fiscal years 2008 through  
15 2011, such sums as are necessary for the oper-  
16 ation of the NMIC and Council.

17 **SEC. 21. REPORT ON SCHOOL DRUG TESTING.**

18 (a) **REPORT REQUIREMENT.**—The Director of Na-  
19 tional Drug Control Policy shall prepare a report on drug  
20 testing in schools. The report shall include a list of sec-  
21 ondary schools that have initiated drug testing from  
22 among those schools that have attended conferences on  
23 drug testing sponsored by the Office of National Drug  
24 Control Policy.



1 (b) DEADLINE.—Not later than 120 days after the  
2 date of the enactment of this Act, the Director of National  
3 Drug Control Policy shall submit to Congress the report  
4 required under subsection (a).

5 **SEC. 22. REPORT ON METHAMPHETAMINE EPIDEMIC.**

6 (a) REPORT REQUIREMENT.—The Director of Na-  
7 tional Drug Control Policy shall prepare a report on meth-  
8 amphetamine usage in the United States. The report shall  
9 describe the usage by zip code based on information ob-  
10 tained from industrial and school drug testing and sei-  
11 zures of clandestine laboratories.

12 (b) DEADLINE.—Not later than 120 days after the  
13 date of the enactment of this Act, the Director of National  
14 Drug Control Policy shall submit to Congress the report  
15 required under subsection (a).

16 **SEC. 23. REPORT ON ONDCP PERFORMANCE BONUSES.**

17 (a) REPORT REQUIREMENT.—The Director of Na-  
18 tional Drug Control Policy shall prepare a report on per-  
19 formance bonuses at the Office of National Drug Control  
20 Policy. The report shall include a list of employees who  
21 received performance bonuses, and the amount of such bo-  
22 nuses, for the period beginning on October 1, 2004, and  
23 ending on the date of submission of the report.

24 (b) DEADLINE.—Not later than 120 days after the  
25 date of the enactment of this Act, the Director of National
