In section 101 of National and Community Service Act of 1990 (as proposed to be amended by section 1102 of the bill), strike the close quotation mark and following period at the end of paragraph (40) and insert the following:

1 “(41) PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER.—The term
2 ‘public safety officer’ has the meaning given such
3 term in section 1204 of the Omnibus Crime Control
4 and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. 3796b).”.

In section 122(a) of the National and Community Service Act of 1990 (as proposed to be amended by section 1302 of the bill), insert “public safety,” after “veteran,”.

In section 122(a) of the National and Community Service Act of 1990 (as proposed to be amended by section 1302 of the bill), insert after paragraph (4) the following:

5 (5) PUBLIC SAFETY CORPS.—A Public Safety
6 Corps that identified unmet needs for public safety

1 through activities such as those described in sub-
2 paragraph (A) and meets or exceeds the perform-
3 ance indicators under subparagraph (B).

4 (A) ACTIVITIES.—A Public Safety Corps
5 described in this paragraph may carry out ac-
6 tivities such as—

7 (i) promoting community-base efforts
8 to improve public safety;

9 (ii) recruiting public safety officers
10 into service opportunities to work with dis-
11 advantaged youth;

12 (iii) developing projects to prevent re-
13 cidivism and assist individuals reentering
14 their communities after incarceration;

15 (iv) providing community outreach ef-
16 forts for general safety and disaster pre-
17 paredness;

18 (v) promoting the value of a career in
19 public safety including internship programs
20 for youth;

21 (vi) providing for neighborhood watch
22 activities;

23 (vii) assisting victims of crime;

1 (viii) providing public safety services
2 and outreach to non-native English speak-
3 ing individuals; and

4 (ix) assisting homeless individuals,
5 families and youth.

6 (B) PUBLIC SAFETY CORPS INDICATORS.—

7 The corps indicators for the corps described in
8 this paragraph are—

9 (i) the number of public safety offi-
10 cers engaged in volunteer service opportu-
11 nities;

12 (ii) the reduction in crime and recidi-
13 vism;

14 (iii) the number of community mem-
15 bers participating in neighborhood watch
16 programs;

17 (iv) the number of programs available
18 to victims of crime;

19 (v) the number of disadvantaged
20 youth engaged in mentoring relationships
21 with public safety officers;

22 (vi) the number of public safety serv-
23 ices available to non-native English speak-
24 ers; and

1 (vii) the number of public safety re-
2 sources available to communities and dis-
3 advantaged individuals.
